



Admissions

Children who have their fifth birthday during the school year, will be offered a place in our Reception Class. They will start in the September after their fourth birthday, in line with the County Admissions Policy. If we become full, the County use the following criteria:

- Children in Looked After Care.
- Children who have a 'Statement of Special Educational Needs'.
- Children who have siblings in the school.
- Any special medical factors making the choice of this school essential.
- Priority given to those who are geographically closest to the school.

When children are admitted to the school, parents are required to fill in an admission form, medical form, permissions form and a Home/School Agreement.



An induction programme takes place during the summer term prior to the child starting school, including visits to the school and liaison between our teachers.

For the first four weeks of the school year, Reception children are introduced on a part time basis.





Teaching and Assessment

The curriculum is divided into three key stages:

- **Foundation Stage (ages 3-5),**
- **Key Stage 1 (ages 5-7) and**
- **Key Stage 2 (ages 7-11).**

In the Foundation Stage learning is carefully planned and structured, with an emphasis on activities that are fun, relevant and motivating for each child.

The teaching team deliver the curriculum through planned play as well as extending and developing children's spontaneous play to enhance their learning further.

The children also play an active role in determining what they should be achieving. The children's development and attainment is continually monitored so that each child's progress can be evaluated to guide planning for the future.

At the end of KS1, the children are assessed in English, Mathematics and Science and they are assessed by SATs at the end of KS2.

Our pupils are closely supported and monitored to make sure they are reaching their full potential at all times, but in a way that we make non-stressful and positive.

The School Curriculum

The three core subjects taught in the curriculum are English, Mathematics and Science. Other subjects taught are Geography, History, Religious Education, Computing, French (Statutory at KS2), Art and Design, P.E, Music, Design and Technology, PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education). RSE is taught age appropriately throughout the school. Each child is taught according to his or her appropriate level, age and ability. Teachers plan co-operatively, to ensure continuity and progress.

Each class has a full range of resources and equipment and the school is fortunate to have a large number of teaching assistants (T.A's) and higher level teaching assistants (HLTA's), supporting the teachers. Assessment is continuous throughout the children's time at the school.

Of course, traditional learning is at the core of each class, and our children have to learn to sit still, listen, co-operate and behave well: we take discipline very seriously, but we also make learning great fun.

Special Education Needs and Disabilities

At Castle Hill we use the Graduated Pathway to identify when children are experiencing barriers to their learning and tailor specific support to enable pupils to overcome these barriers. The practice of personalising learning applies to all pupils across the learning spectrum and for academically more able pupils this means the provision of additional challenges as well as opportunities to attend events to develop their particular talents.

When children are identified as needing additional support, the school adheres to the SEND Code of Practice.

Using a system of My Plan, My Plan Plus or an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP), we ensure that each child's needs are individually and appropriately catered for and that any relevant outside agencies are involved in providing guidance and support. Parents, carers and pupils are fully part of this process. In all cases our aim is to provide the very best education for all pupils, enabling all children to fully achieve their potential.

Medical Facilities

All staff are trained in First Aid. If a child suffers an injury at school, the staff will use their expertise to decide how best to treat the child. All accidents are recorded in the accident Report Log. The school maintains a record of contact details for each child, which are regularly updated. Whenever necessary, parents will be contacted immediately.



Medicines are not to be brought to school as staff will not administer them unless children have an agreed IHCP (Individual Health Care Plan) with the school.

Children should not return to school after a bout of sickness or diarrhoea for 48 hours after the last episode.



Busy Bees Playgroup

We are a happy and well established community playgroup operating within Castle Hill Primary School.

As a community playgroup, it is run by the parents who use it. Their aim is to foster the all round development of each individual child and to provide them with a sound foundation to starting school.

Liaison between school and playgroup is extremely good. There are many opportunities throughout the year for pre-school children to join in activities, which help prepare them for the transition to school.

Our Creative Curriculum

At Castle Hill Primary School we empower children through a broad and balanced curriculum. We do this by making learning specific, passionate, contextual and authentic. This way children learn knowledge and skills from all subjects and apply them through cumulative and cohesive topics. Topics include Tomb Raiders, Rocking Through the Ages and Megastructures.

We promote a philosophy of 'do with not for' where children feel a real sense of ownership of their own learning.

Adult help is often required for visits and parents are invited to volunteer their services! It is essential to have written confirmation for any visit. Without it your child will be unable to attend. At present the school organises a residential trip for Year 6 to the Forest of Dean.

At the end of the school day children should be collected from the playground. We expect all Foundation Stage and KS1 children to be met after school. Every child is handed over to a known adult. Lower KS2 teachers will also escort the children into the playground.

Upper KS2 will be released from the classroom. If somebody unknown to the teacher is picking up your child please inform the school in advance.

School Uniform

The school is proud of its image and seeks to promote a high standard of dress to help instil in the children a sense of pride in the school. We want children to conform to this to prevent them feeling left out. Our school uniform comprises of black or grey skirt/trousers, a white polo shirt and a navy blue sweatshirt with the school logo.

In summer the pupils can choose to wear blue checked dresses or wear grey shorts. For P.E, the children wear a T-shirt in their House Colour with black shorts. Uniform is available to buy from The Uniform Shop in Gloucester.

Every child is expected to wear dark coloured shoes. Trainers are not accepted as suitable for daily footwear. Extreme haircuts are inappropriate in colour and style.

Homework Policy

We have a very clear Homework Policy, which was produced following an in-depth consultation and working party process with parents. It is expected that anyone joining Castle Hill will embrace this opportunity to work in partnership. Homework enables parents to play an active part in supporting your child's education and also prepares the older children for the demands of secondary school.

Absence

If your child is absent from school then please let the office know as soon as possible in the morning or in advance if the absence is due to a medical appointment or exam etc. You can do this by telephone: 01452 863380. It is important that we are notified on each day of the absence. If the school has not had notification or reason for absence then the office staff will try and contact you as soon as possible in the morning once the registers have been checked. This is to ensure that the parents and the school know that the child is safe.



Mobile phones

In exceptional circumstances if a mobile is essential, then the named telephone must be left in the school office at the beginning of the day. The telephone is the pupil's responsibility and they must remember to collect it at the end of the day. No other pupil may collect it for them.

Holidays during term time

Government regulations do not allow the school to authorise family holidays during term time. Parents are asked to recognise that children who are taken out of school during term time will miss certain modules or units of work which may not be repeated.

Breakfast Club

There is a warm welcome at Breakfast Club for any child wanting to attend.

You can pre-book your child into as many sessions as is required (subject to availability), Monday to Friday 8am-8.45am at a cost of £4.00 per day

Healthy School meals are cooked on site and are provided daily. These are free for all children in KS1. Payment for KS2 children should be made in advance online. This is payable in advance. Children may also bring their own packed lunch to school.



Clubs

At Castle Hill there is a fantastic range of after school clubs at various times of the year. Our clubs are run by teachers as well as other outside agencies.

The children in Year 5 and 6 receive swimming lessons, and Bikeability sessions are held in and around the school grounds for Year 6.

The Keep

The Keep was the part of the Castle that was used to store valuable possessions. We know that your child is your most valuable possession and you want them to be happy and safe.

Your child will have the opportunity to relax and unwind after a busy day at school in an environment that is separate from the classroom. Music

Instrumental instruction by peripatetic teachers is available for a variety of instruments.

We embrace whole class music sessions delivered by a county specialist eg: brass, Samba drumming etc.



Parents and the Wider Community

There are good links with parents who are encouraged to play an active part in their children's education. Parents were fully consulted in the development of the Home School Agreement and the Homework Policy. We welcome and value the voluntary help provided by parents in the classroom.

We have a well-established Parent and Teacher Association (The Friends). Enthusiastic committee members organise a range of fundraising and social events that are well supported by the community.

We realise the importance of good links with the local community and lend our support to activities in the school locality.
